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What is primary care?

- Keywords used by World Health Organization (WHO)
 - first-contact, accessible, continuous, comprehensive, coordinated, person-focused
- Important reminders for doctors, who may be overwhelmed by sheer volume of patients, on the fundamentals of primary care

- Polyclinic system
 - First polyclinic, former Queenstown polyclinic, opened in 1963
 - Polyclinics provide subsidised primary care and also referral to specialist doctors in hospitals
 - currently 23 polyclinics in Singapore, target of 32 polyclinics by 2030
 - Dental services available at selected polyclinics
 - Often long waiting times

- Community Health Assist Scheme (CHAS)
 - Allow Singapore citizens to enjoy government subsidies at private primary care clinics which participate in the CHAS scheme, for specific medical conditions
 - Part of distributing workload away from polyclinics

- Public Health Preparedness Clinic (PHPC)
 - primary care response to public health emergencies such as the influenza pandemic, haze and anthrax outbreak into a single scheme for better management.
 - also activated during severe haze in 2015
 - After activation, participating clinics receive Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) from Ministry of Health, and also priority access to antivirals, antibiotics, and/or vaccines from national stockpile Singapore
 - Activated during COVID-19

- Family Physician scheme
 - Primary care doctors who qualify, can use the term Family Physician, part of process to recognise family medicine / primary care as a "specialty"
 - 2011 establishment of Register of Family Physicians
 - Grandfathering clause at beginning of scheme, to allow experienced primary care doctors the opportunity to be accredited, via practice route

- Background: 3 major medical associations in Singapore
 - Academy of Medicine, Singapore (AMS)
 - College of Family Physicians, Singapore (CFPS)
 - Singapore Medical Association (SMA)
- The 3 professional bodies work closely together, to complement each other
- Primary care efforts are usually handled by CFPS



Contributions by SMA [con't]

- Sold PPE to doctors/clinics during initial mask shortage during COVID-19
- Joint AMS-CFPS-SMA survey on public sentiments towards the National Electronic Health Record
- Articles and thematic issues on primary care in SMA News
- Provided quickstart guide to Telemedicine, to help doctors in primary care
- Train-and-place scheme to train clinic assistants for clinics

Current status [as of Jun 2023]

• Healthier SG

- new empanelment programme for entire population, patient to choose 1 family medicine clinic as his/her designated clinic
- Switch to capitation model for public healthcare institutions
- Population health measures, e.g. exercise prescription, working with other professions, e.g. physiotherapists, dietitians, etc.



Current status [as of Jun 2023] [con't]

- National Electronic Health Records
 - Upcoming Health Information Bill, when passed into law, will likely mandate compulsory participation in National Electronic Health Records system
 - Will clinics be ready for implementation?

- Is primary care ready for aging population in Singapore?

- How can private primary care clinics sustain financially, with pressures of inflation and competition?
